Milestone Reached: A New Home for the New Canaan Land Trust



President's Message

Let me start my first letter as your president by thanking my friend and predecessor, Tom Cronin, for his exceptional five years as president from 2018 to 2023. After ten years on the board, Tom will soon move to our new Advisory Council. Thank you, Tom.

My introduction to New Canaan Land Trust goes back to 2014 when my wife Margie and I donated a conservation easement to the Land Trust. The easement abuts our

home and includes wetlands rich with bird life along the Rippowam River. Protecting this beautiful habitat in perpetuity has been so meaningful to us.

The following year I joined the capital campaign committee to raise funds to purchase the Silvermine Fowler Preserve, creating expanded walking trails on the east side of town. I was invited to join the board in 2016.

With your support, much has been achieved over the past year, as described in this Annual Impact Report:

- We acquired the historic Grupes House on Valley Road as our future headquarters, reuniting the property with our Browne Preserve. Finally, the Land Trust has its own home.

- We entered a public-private partnership with the town to extend our expertise as land stewards to the town-owned Bristow Bird Sanctuary, which celebrates its centennial this year.
- We hired our first full-time land steward, expanding our staff to three.
- We established an Advisory Council with former officers and other significant contributors to the success of the Land Trust's mission.

As we look to the future, we aim to reach many more milestones. Our top priority is to permanently protect additional open space in New Canaan. Our 2020 Strategic Plan sets the ambitious goal of protecting another 400 acres by 2040. Protecting open space yields many benefits: safeguarding water quality, preserving habitat and stemming the decline of wildlife populations, retaining New Canaan's character, and improving climate resilience. This 20-year goal recognizes the high stakes we face with climate change and the essential role that NCLT plays locally in protecting our natural resources.

As with everything we do, we can only achieve this with your help.

A Message from the Executive Director

The 2024 Annual Impact Report is marked by a significant milestone—the acquisition of the Grupes House on Valley Road. This historic 1805 house will serve as our headquarters, a testament to our growth and development. We eagerly anticipate the necessary improvements to transform it into an office and outdoor demonstration site. This achievement would not have been

possible without the support of our dedicated community, and for that, we are truly grateful.

This year was also one of comings and goings. We welcomed Brian Cucchiara as our first-ever Land Steward as well as two new board members, Sarah Hering and John Fusek. If John's name sounds familiar it's because he was previously on the Board from 2012 to 2018. We look forward to working with the three of them. We said farewell to four key board members whose terms expired: Art Berry, Sandy Nissley, Chris Schipper, and Al Tibbets. All were stalwart leaders at NCLT and will be sorely missed. We are very grateful for their service to the New Canaan community.

Summer is the time for stewarding our protected land. Our new collaboration with the Town of New Canaan to steward the Bristow Bird Sanctuary and Wildwood Preserve means the Land Trust is responsible for stewarding over 400 acres. A lot of our stewardship work is performed by student interns. In early July, we began our second summer of collaboration with Future 5 to bring high schoolers from Stamford and New Canaan together to mow, rake, clear, and build walkways, bridges, and kiosks to improve our nature preserves. A generous Harlan and Lois Anderson Family Foundation grant funds this productive and fun program.

Our Last Saturday on the Trail outings program has been a resounding success, attracting hundreds of nature enthusiasts to our preserves. These outings not only provide a platform for people to enjoy the outdoors but also serve as an educational opportunity to learn more about the natural world. From children's programs to nature education, there's something for everyone. Visit our website to learn about the rest of our 2024 outings. We look forward to seeing you out on the trails!

I close with a heartfelt thank you to all the members, donors, and volunteers who have tirelessly given their time, enthusiasm, and dollars to support land conservation in New Canaan. Our future is bright and it's all because of you.

New Canaan Land Trust Headquarters

We have exciting news! In April, the Land Trust purchased the historic house and surrounding 1.8-acre property at 1124 Valley Road in New Canaan to serve as our headquarters. Known locally as the Grupes House, we have been negotiating with the First Taxing District, a water company in Norwalk, to acquire this property for almost a year. We are grateful for the support of lead donors, the Town of New Canaan, and the Land Trust's Board of Directors, who helped us reach this milestone.

The Grupes House acquisition is critical to the near and long-term goals of the New Canaan Land Trust:

- The purchase conserves additional acres adjacent to our 10-acre Brown Preserve, protecting this land from development and ensuring it is forever conserved.
- The historic Grupes House (built ca. 1805) has been reunited with the land that residents have farmed since New Canaan's founding.
- The antique home, an icon of the early history of New Canaan, is permanently protected (and not razed as considered in 2015).
- The new headquarters will serve as the home base for our intern, volunteer, and youth empowerment programs – all vital connections to our community. The second floor will serve as our Executive Director's residence, which will be beneficial in recruiting and retaining the best professional talent.
- The purchase fosters a positive collaboration with one of the local water companies, which collectively hold the largest amounts of undeveloped land in New Canaan. Water companies will be critical partners for the Land Trust in reaching our future conservation goals.
- We fulfill our 2019 strategic plan's goal of establishing a permanent headquarters for the Land Trust.

This acquisition positions the Land Trust for continued growth and success in achieving our core mission: To protect land in perpetuity. In the coming months, we will prepare the property for our use. Be on the lookout for more information about our plans for the property. This is the beginning of a new, exciting chapter for the Land Trust to continue conserving open space in our town.

Engaging our Youth

2024 was the second year of the New Canaan-Stamford summer internship program with the Future 5 organization, which aids under-resourced students in Stamford. Seven high schoolers from New Canaan and six from Stamford spent three 3-week sessions immersed in land conservation and property stewardship.

Each day was different for the interns. Projects ranged from trail maintenance on NCLT's ten public preserves to information kiosk building and everything in between. Over the three-week session, the interns visited almost all the Land Trust preserves, improving the visitor experience. On Fridays, they took field trips to environmental education sites in Fairfield County, expanding their horizons on conservation as a collective effort. This year, our Land Steward, Brian Cucchiara, masterfully led the internship program.

Our collaboration with Future 5 continues to evolve. As we look ahead to 2025, we see opportunities to add Stamford work sites to the program and to introduce fall, winter, or spring workdays, perhaps on weekends. We are excited to see the Summer Steward Internship Program evolve into a broader collaboration between the Land Trust and Future 5.

In late spring, NCLT once again participated in the New Canaan High School Senior Internship program. In lieu of attending classes, graduating seniors participate in internships to gain real-world experience in subjects that they enjoy. This year, we hosted Michael Fico and Luca Pantaleo. They assisted Brian Cucchiara in installing new information kiosks and preparing the Firefly Sanctuary for the 2024 season.

Over the years, NCLT has been fortunate to work with Boy and Girl Scouts on property stewardship projects, such as building raised walkways over wet areas on walking trails and removing troublesome invasive plants. Since 2013, we've welcomed 47 Eagle Scouts to the Land Trust. This year, Jack Winalski worked with our beekeeper, Steve Burt, to install bee hives at three Land Trust nature preserves, generating 400 pounds of honey. Chris Wells built raised walkways at Colhoun Preserve nature trails. We are very grateful for our association with the scouting programs.





Stewardship News

NCLT – Town Agreement for Stewardship of Bristow Bird Sanctuary and Wildwood Preserve

In October, NCLT and the Town of New Canaan entered into an exciting new agreement for us to guide stewardship of the Bristow Bird Sanctuary and Wildwood Preserve. NCLT's role is to enhance habitat restoration, trail and infrastructure development, and educational opportunities for the Town centered around birding. Because expanding Bristow's bird population is a critical goal for the property, numerous best practices are being employed, including restocking the feeders more frequently, adding large-capacity songbird feeders, supplying a broader variety of bird feed to attract more bird species, and cleaning bird feeders and houses regularly.

2024 is also the centennial anniversary of Bristow Bird Sanctuary. One hundred years ago, New Canaan became a nexus of early conservation when a group of residents and the newly formed Bird Protective Society members acquired 17 acres to create a private bird sanctuary. Bristow is considered the third oldest dedicated bird sanctuary in the country. To commemorate this occasion, the Land Trust, The Friends of Bristow Park, and the Conservation Commission are planning an anniversary celebration on September 8th at 2:00 pm at the Bristow pavilion. Planned activities include an introductory welcome by First Selectman Dionna Carlson, musical performances, the unveiling of a newly commissioned statue, and activities for children. A keynote talk by renowned birder David Sibley promises to be a highlight. Sibley is one of the world's leading ornithologists, author of the popular Sibley Field Guide to Birds, and winner of the Roger Tory Peterson Award from the American Birding Association for Lifetime Achievement in promoting the cause of birding. Stewardship Summit

In March, NCLT collaborated with several other local land trusts to hold a Stewardship Summit on common property maintenance concerns, especially around controlling invasive species. Participants included stewardship representatives from NCLT, Darien Land Trust, Norwalk Land Trust, and Stamford Land Trust. The group will meet semi-annually to discuss best practices in stewardship and ways to collaborate on cross-boundary projects.



American Chestnut Tree Re-introduction

Another example of a cross-boundary project is a new effort to reintroduce blight-resistant chestnut trees to the area. Chestnut trees in our area were largely wiped out by chestnut blight beginning in 1904. NCLT is joining a project with Wilton Land Trust to reintroduce these once-dominant native trees.



What Does New Canaan Land Trust Do?

For those new to NCLT and the land trust world, we thought we'd share a few words about land trusts, their impact, and why they need your support.

Let's start with a definition: According to the Connecticut Land Conservation Council, "land trusts are nonprofit, community-based organizations dedicated to the permanent protection and stewardship of land for public benefit. Land trusts work closely with landowners, communities, and other nonprofits to conserve land in perpetuity through acquisition, gifts of property, or conservation agreements, called conservation easements." Tax-exempt charitable donations support land trusts.

Land trusts nationwide play a vital role in protecting open space, wildlife habitat, and community character. Nearly 1,300 land trusts have conserved over 61 million acres of private land nationwide. That is more than all the national parks combined! In Connecticut, over 130 land trusts oversee more than one out of every 20 acres across the state. Notably, since 2019, Connecticut has seen a 32% increase in open space protected by land trusts. Yet despite this encouraging trend, Connecticut trails behind the other New England states in achieving its stated land conservation goals.

The New Canaan Land Trust was founded in 1967 by three New Canaan residents, Jack Gunther, Elise Lapham, and Mary-Lib Katzenbach. Inspired by the emerging environmental movement, NCLT was created as a private organization that could swiftly protect open space in the face of development. Today, NCLT is the largest private landowner in New Canaan, protecting more than 350 acres of land, with an additional 52 acres under conservation easements. Ten of our properties are open to the public, with 6.1 miles of trails. The organization became accredited in 2019 and re-accredited in 2024.

NCLT has set ambitious goals for future conservation. Our 2020-2040 Strategic Plan set a goal of doubling the number of protected acres to 800 from 400. This 20-year goal recognizes the high stakes that face the planet in the 21st century and the essential role that NCLT, like other land trusts, plays in protecting our natural resources.

So, you may ask: how can I help protect New Canaan as we know it today?

The Council is a non-political advocate and bridge between the Land Trust and the community.

Founding members include Art Berry, John Engel, David Hunt, Julia Portale, Chris Schipper, and Catherine Sturgess. Kevin Moynihan and Tom Nissley joined this spring. The Council meets annually. The inaugural meeting of the Advisory Council was held in January, and the topic was the acquisition of the new NCLT headquarters property on Valley Road. The next meeting is scheduled for October 2024.


New Staff Member – Brian Cucchiara

In April, we welcomed Brian Cucchiara as our full-time land steward and summer internship coordinator. This new position for NCLT was added to better serve the thousands of community members and guests who visit our nature preserves each year. Brian manages over 350 acres of undeveloped land and our newly acquired headquarters property on Valley Road.

During his first few months, Brian maintained our 6-miles of walking trails, readied the Firefly Sanctuary and Colhoun Preserve for our busy firefly visitation season in early July, and coordinated the Land Trust's participation in our recently signed agreement with the Town of New Canaan to steward the Bristow Bird Sanctuary and Wildwood Preserve. He managed our flagship summer stewardship internship program with young people from New Canaan and Stamford this summer. Looking ahead, Brian will be leading our expanded efforts to control invasive plant species on our properties.



Board Member Arrival and Departures






Fiscal Year 2024 Revenue
